### Children's Church is Growing!

Our Children's Ministries are growing! In the next few weeks, we are happy to share that, with the help of parent volunteers, we will begin offering Children's Church at both services.

Our Children's Church program has evolved over the years, and we currently focus on preparing the children to actively participate in "big" worship. How do we do this?

- We meet in the chapel, instead of a classroom, where the children can hear everything that's happening in worship, including the sermon.
- We provide Children's Bulletins that tie into the message for the day.
- We pause what we're doing and say the Lord's Prayer with the congregation.
- We discuss prayer concerns that the children may have.
- We share a story that connects with the sermon.
- We provide coloring pages, activity sheets, puzzles, and small toys so that kids can move as they need to, but still listen to what's happening in the church without disruption.
- We take the children up for Communion with the rest of the Calvary family each Communion Sunday.

We teach them about worship elements, the seasons of the church year, and other important details related to worship at Calvary.

We will be looking for more volunteers to help make this a success. Teaching our children how to actively participate in worship is one of the best gifts we can give children. Authentic worship experiences will stay with them throughout their lives. ### **Church Conference Scheduled Saturday, October 24**



## Keeping Score: 99 to 1...And Still Pitchin'

The announcer leans into the microphone. The crowd hushes. And here comes the word everyone's been waiting for, "NOW PITCHING FOR THE HOME TEAM: Lucille Etzler!" Cheers erupt. The visitor's team is shaken. Batters just look at each other, as if to say, "Now what'll we do? Go up to the plate and withstand the heat, or just throw down our bats and give up? We got no chance against 'Lightning Lucille' and her elusive fast ball!"



Did it really happen like that all those years ago when Lucille and the other farm kids played baseball in the field after the Sunday, late day milking was done? Well, maybe not *exactly*. But the games were good enough to linger on the loving heart of 'Lightning Lucille' for nine decades. (I made up the nickname, I admit). And maybe good enough to get recited for eager nieces and nephews. (She counted 14. She admitted there might be a few more if she had time to name them.) And included in her telling, there might just be the fact that the players were both black and white, just like brothers and sisters, and nobody thought a thing about it. So goes the wonderful story. But there's much more to be learned from Lucille and her life. Much more indeed.

Get a jump on your day, for example. If your earliest memory's getting up at 4:30 AM to milk thirty cows, you sorta get in the habit. Be patient and persistent. Work with kindness and competence. You can come a long way from Walkersville and Liberty School and Strayer Business College. There might be a job with Avery Shoemaker at the county agent's office, or America's largest brush company, Ox Fiber Brush (now gone), or even with Mr. Steven at Ft. Detrick. Be independent. (Especially if you're not sure there's a man capable enough to keep you!) Love your mother and father, your family, your Lord and your church. Take your place in line when the church processes from E. Church St. to 2<sup>nd</sup> and Bentz to take up residence in Frederick's Methodist Cathedral. Love to go there every Sunday. Look forward to it 'til you get past your Biblical three score and ten and take on a score more years. And know that God is with you always. Even if your legs can't still do the high kick, let your arms show the preacher your windup. You still got it, even when the scoreboard shows the Time Team's scored 99 runs on ya. You're still in the game!


"The Israelites said to them (Moses and Aaron), 'If only we had died by the Lord's hand in Egypt! There we sat around pots of meat and ate all the food we wanted, but you have brought us out into this desert to starve this entire assembly to death." Exodus 16: 3

Oh life was so, so much better not so long ago, back in Egypt. The Israelites sat around with plenty of food, meat in every pot and they had all they wanted to their fill. At least that is how they remembered their 400 years in Egypt. They blamed Moses and Aaron for their certain death in the desert, trapped with no hope for future of plenty and ease. They had left the 12 springs of water at Elim days ago. Now no food, no water, no hope.

Human nature has not changed much from then. We do the same thing that the Israelites were doing over 3500 years ago. When we are faced with difficulties and hardships we harken back to the "good times" of the past – forgetting the bad, such as slavery under harsh Egyptian rule. The Israelites thought their lives in the desert to be so dismal they wished to have perished by God's hand instead of being helped at his hand. How many miracles of saving grace had God performed to bring the Israelites out of Egypt? Instead of trusting God to continue to care for them as he promised, they lost all hope and were blaming Moses and Aaron for causing all their misfortunes. They forgot God. When faced with the uncertainties of the future we forget that God is ever present and will give us his hand in blessing.

Hardship(s) and uncertainties can be considered tests of our faith. How much do we believe in the promises of God to care for us and to lead us through the desert to the promise land? When faced with "starvation" and "thirst" in a desert (even of our own making) do we stay in the arms of our Father, the God who gives us all of his love and mercy or do we retreat into our own failed and failing state?

Calvary is facing its own tests of its corporate faith. Do we, as members, have the enough faith in God to know that he is leading us into a realm of discipleship that reflects generous stewardship for the expansion of Calvary's ministry? Are we limiting ourselves because we lack the faith to move into the unknown future with God by our side? Are we not Christians, a people of Christ! We are called to do more, do greater, to go further than others who are not in Christ.
