Church and Society Ministry Team will meet, Saturday, November 2 in the library at 9:30 a.m.

Beginning in January 2020, Calvary's Church and Society Ministry Team will meet *every other month on the 2nd Saturday at 9:30 am in the library*. Thus, after our November meeting, unless otherwise notified, we will meet on the 2nd Saturday of January, March, May, July, September, and November of 2020.

Also, our ministry team's Table Talk on environmental and social justice issues will be held after the 8:30 am worship service (10 am in the summer) in Parish Hall on the Sunday immediately following our bi-monthly meetings.

At the September meeting of the Church Council, I brought up the possibility of changing our Sunday morning worship schedule. We've done this over the past several summers so it's not entirely new, but making such a change would come with some upsides as well as some downsides. Our worship attendance has gotten smaller over the past ten or more years. Given the large worship space we enjoy, having 100 to 150 people at each worship service still leaves many open seats and empty spaces. Holding one worship service each Sunday would provide the opportunity for more of the whole congregation to be gathered at one time and the adult choir would be able to be present at all the worship services instead of being shared across the two services. The major downside would be losing the choice of worship times.

Since I brought this matter up at the Church Council, it has been discussed informally in some of the Sunday School classes, the Education Committee, the Sanctuary Choir, and the Worship Committee. PLEASE NOTE: NO DECISION HAS BEEN MADE TO CHANGE THE SUNDAY WORSHIP SCHEDULE. There isn't even a specific plan under consideration at this point.

Much more discussion is needed in order to learn the various pluses and minuses involved in making any sort of change.

In my opinion, there are several things that we would want to preserve no matter what.

- We need to be a separate time for Sunday School and worship.
- We need to preserve time for fellowship and conversation in the Fellowship Hall.
- We will need to make sure that the schedule will allow us to continue to offer ministry to the Grateful Hearts members.
- Each worship service we offer will include hospitality, music, a message and welcome that new guests and current members will want to return to each week.
- In the coming weeks and months, there will be various opportunities for you to share your thoughts and ideas on this matter. This will a forum for discussion, a congregational survey and the presentation of a specific set of plans for your consideration. As we go along, you can also send your thoughts directly to me at <u>RevSteve@calvaryumc.org</u>. Whatever will be decided --whether to stick with our current plan or introduce some changes-- will only come about after there has been careful listening and considerable prayer.

I noticed a pile of acorns stashed at the base of an oak tree in front of the church. You could not miss the pile because of the large number. My first thought was a squirrel planning ahead – must have been a number of them working in concert. Or, it could have been a child's effort to occupy their time.

It is funny how thoughts string together. My next thought was about amassing enough stuff (money) to get through the cold winter or

through a comfortable retirement – both requiring stuff (money) to keep me in house and home, and as comfortable as possible – the rich fool (Luke 12: 16) is the image.

How much stuff do I need? Would simple comfort, or opulent luxury, or somewhere in between be enough? There are financial advisors to help answer that question. What an advisor cannot tell us is how to use our acorns, the collected money. How much are we to serve God today with what we have? What is so important that we cannot give more to God and rely on the promises made by him to care for our needs?

We see how quickly Christian stewardship arises when confronted with worldly needs in opposition to heavenly desires. We set goals to discipline ourselves. However, we innately know our thinking is flawed when we lean too much toward worldly needs.

Goals are a good thing. Goals instill frugality, to save and even give up one thing for another for the future. Goals develop in us a work ethic. Paul said that if there is no work there is no food. To great of focus on one goal can corrupt our proper thinking of God and his desire for our working with him in his kingdom on earth - doing those things that are not foolish.

A goal can be a new or larger home, or a second home for vacation and enjoyment. How about a red - fast sport car you have always dreamed about or a boat that is bigger than a kayak! Those certainly are rewards for frugality and hard work. Yet we innately know our thinking is still flawed. Those are not forever things.

Could there be a goal that is greater and of more value than those earthly ones? Think of the found pearl and the buried treasure. Jesus says there is something of greater value – it is the goal of entering the heavenly kingdom that God promised would exist in all of eternity. Jesus spoke often of this proper goal of man while living in this world with the kingdom of God so near. He told us to think of heavenly things and not worldly things. Jesus spoke of God's clothing the lilies of the field in finery and food for the birds. Treasure of your heart over treasure of the world should be our goal. Setting goals has everything to do with stewardship.

Stewardship is not a once a year action or an "oh yea" moment. Stewardship, to a Christian, is a way of living a life today and every day. It reflects how we think of God and how we serve him in this world. Stewardship is exchanging the boat, or beach house for the heavenly way of giving up that worldly object in order to give to God and his kingdom on earth to save lost souls. It is a way to save your own lost soul.

Jesus said there will be an eternal reward for feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, and giving light to the blind. I think I can give up a few acorns if I can give light to someone.


We can plan and create but without helping hands, we will not have the grand event for which we are known in the community. Please consider helping in some way. Every contribution helps.

<u>A Fond Farewell</u>

It is with a full heart and a proud spirit that I bid Calvary farewell for now. After spending the months of August and September serving full time as the Interim Pastor at Taylorsville UMC in Mount Airy and continuing my ministry at Calvary on a limited basis, the time has come to devote my full attention to Taylorsville. Know that this decision was not easy and leaving a church is always a mixed blessing, but it is part of the call of being clergy in the United Methodist system.

We have been through a great deal of change together in the six years I spent at Calvary, including three lead pastors, two associate pastors, and several youth leaders and other changes in both staff and lay leadership. Yet through all that change, ministries sprouted, grew, or were redesigned. The Lord's laundry serves 40-50 of our neighbors in need of a permanent home each week. We provided a warm bed and shelter for families in need of a permanent home for two weeks in a row, twice a year, for as long as I was with you, through the Religious Coalition's Emergency Family Shelter Program.

I was blessed to be part of mission teams which traveled to Puerto Rico three times, as well as teams that went to Maine and the Henderson Settlement. I have faith that the Mission Steering Committee and the VIM trained leaders will continue to guide the mission teams to plan trips which are meaningful and built upon relationships with those who are being served and those you will serve along side in the years to come.

I also have faith that the Habitat for Humanity projects will continue under the leadership of Andrew Wilde and Pastor Steve (who is on their board).

And then there is all the justice work that we accomplished together. The Church in Society team has worked tirelessly over the past several years to help educate the congregation on a variety of social issues from a theological standpoint. This includes climate justice, poverty, the oppression of our immigrant and refugee neighbors and our LGBTQIA+ siblings. I was proud to be part of the reconciling process when the Church in Society group became part of the Reconciling Ministries Network last year.

Calvary has a legacy of being the church downtown that people know for its good music and its helping hands. While I am sad to leave the beautiful sanctuary and wonderful congregation, I know that you all will continue the legacy and continue to build upon it. For you are yet alive.
