When can we do church again?

We all miss coming together. Perhaps you recall the words from the hymn:

"Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love,

the fellowship of kindred hearts is like to that above"

It is good to come together to worship, to pray, to see one another, to be in community. As the weeks of staying at home continue, we miss each other more and more.

As of Friday, May 15, Governor Larry Hogan opened up some businesses and public spaces while other remain closed. Some of the recommendations involve religious communities gathering for worship. We are planning at this moment to have the buildings remain closed through the end of May. No decisions have been made beyond that date.

By the time you read this, the situation and recommendations are likely to have changed in several ways. The situation is fluid and dynamic as we continue to learn more about the virus and its transmission. One thing, however, should never change. The church should always be concerned with the well-being of others. One of the best ways to show love is first "do no harm." We will need to err on the side of safety, particularly for those who are most vulnerable.

We have been growing in our ability to do church ministry in new ways. Bible study, worship, prayer and fellowship activities are available in online formats and people are appreciative for what is offered. Some of what we are doing is actually reaching many people that were not coming to our building before the pandemic. Our online worship services regularly are getting more than 700 clicks or visits each week. We will continue to offer online worship and other ministries for the foreseeable future so that people can participate who may not feel safe to come to the buildings. Of course, not everyone can make use of these ministries, but they have become meaningful to many who do.

I've been reading articles and emails and meeting with other colleagues about what might be prudent when it comes to gathering together and the use of the church buildings. As time goes on there will be ways that we may begin to offer services and other events in person. We don't have outdoor spaces available to do "drive up" worship in cars but it might be possible to arrange for the use of a parking lot for this purpose. I've contacted the City of Frederick to see about the possible use of the Bandshell for outdoor services this summer. (They aren't issuing permits at this time.) We will continue to consider these and other options including how to re-open our own facilities.

To this end, I am working with leaders in the congregation to form a task force to look at our context and all the key matters that will need to be considered before resuming in-person gatherings. This includes:

- Do church members feel ready and willing to return? (If no one feel safe to come, it doesn't really matter if the building is open or closed)
- Do we have the ability to sanitize the facilities adequately?
- Can we maintain appropriate social distancing?
- What worship practices will need to be modified or eliminated for the time being?
- What other programs can we provide safely?

(Can we, for example, provide Sunday School, Bible studies, weddings and other gatherings on site?)

Many of the things we've routinely done in the building on a Sunday morning in the past can actually spread the transmission of the virus. It is highly possible for people to unknowingly share the virus with others through public singing, using a hymnal or bulletin, the passing of offering plates, and conversation at coffee/fellowship time. Even though the sanctuary is large and would allow for adequate spacing, we have to consider how to adequately disinfect the pews and pew cushions, doorways, restrooms, handrails and other areas used by those who enter the building.

The bottom line is that we can be a witness and a sign of God's grace wherever we are. God is still with us, we are not alone. We are still the body of Christ and we are still doing the work of ministry, growing in our walk with Christ, offering care to those in need, lifting up hope, making disciples for the transformation of the world. So, we never stopped doing "church", we just shifted in the ways we do it.

Christians sometimes limit their thinking about "worship" as that time spent in church Sunday morning. We sing, pray, repeat the creeds, listen to Scripture, and are reminded of who we are through Pastoral care and leadership. With us in self-imposed quarantine gathering to worship is not available to

But why limit yourself to Sunday morning community worship? Worship should be incorporated daily into your faith life as a spiritual discipline. The same faith discipline as meditation and prayer are practiced disciplines. A practiced faith life with discipline is an ordered way of living that sets us before God so he can transform us.

To support worship as a discipline, there are things we can do to enhance the experience of God within our hearts. Learn to be still and open yourself to the presence of the Holy Spirit. Meditation is a time where stillness can be entered. Psalm 37:7 says "Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him,..." and "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among nations, I will be exalted in the earth." (Psalm 46:10)

Learn to practice the presence of God daily. Be aware, use all your five senses as well as your sixth sense. Paul says "Pray without ceasing." (Thessalonians 5:17) Cultivate the inner words of adoration, praise and thanksgiving.

Worship in all things and in all ways. Pew sitting is not mandatory. Give thanks for someone's smile or a white puffy cloud. Honor God at the family table, not just in grace over the meal, but in conversation.

Prepare yourself for the time of worship. Read the study scriptures ahead and meditate upon them. Pray for guidance as you enter or join the group. Think about what you will bring to God as your New Covenant offering and ask God if this is what he wants of you. Are you reflecting your blessings from God in your presence and gifts presented to God?

Enter with an open heart and a willingness to encounter God. This is call the proper attitude. Leave your own agenda in the car or at home. Think of some of your blessings received and acknowledge your dependence upon God's mercy and grace even more evident is this time.





What is Zoom and how do I use it?

Are you wondering what Zoom is? It's an online meeting platform you can call into using your phone or an audio only option, but it is primarily a group video chat. Check out the Zoom instructions below!



If you haven't used Zoom before:

On a computer: when you click the meeting link it may prompt you to add the Zoom extension to your browser - this is totally safe to do. It may also just automatically ask for your camera and mic access - this is also safe! Once you grant access you will be connected to the meeting.

On a smart phone or tablet: when you click the meeting link it'll prompt you to down-load the Zoom app if you don't already have it. When it's installed, go back to the link and click Join Meeting, and it will automatically connect you.

By phone: dial the meeting telephone number provided. When it asks, enter the meeting code you've been provided for that particular meeting. We'll be able to hear you but not see you (like a conference call). It can be a house phone or flip phone, doesn't need to be a smart phone!

Once you have the Zoom app on your tablet, phone or computer, then next time you want to join a meeting on Zoom, you can open the app, click on "join a meeting" and enter the meeting code, and you are ready to Zoom.

* Tips for Using Zoom *

I recommend using headphones during the meeting - otherwise your computer hears your computer playing the sound of the meeting and then sends it out as what it thinks you are saying, creating an echo and sometimes a screech!

I also recommend learning about the Mute button. Zoom tries to pick up all sound going on around you - the dog's collar jingling, grandkids asking for a pencil sharpener, even the dishwasher starting a new cycle. If there are many people on at once this can get overwhelming. So if you're not talking, hit the Mute button (usually in the lower left hand corner of your screen) and it won't pick up on all that background noise.
