This year we are planning to reintroduce an in-person study during the Lenten season. We will not be providing a meal, but we will have a chance for people to learn and have conversations together each Wednesday designed to help us grow in our understanding and practice of our Christian faith.

Our Lenten Study this year will be based on *The Screwtape Letters* by C.S. Lewis a classic work in Christian literature. It is a sly and ironic portrayal of human life from the vantage point of Screwtape, a highly placed assistant to "Our Father Below." C.S. Lewis gives us the advice and instructions of senior tempter/devil to his nephew Wormwood, a novice devil who is still learning how to corrupt and lead persons astray. Filled with sharp insights into temptation, repentance, and grace, this wonderful tale explores what it means to live a good, honest life.

Dr. Jerry Root is a retired professor of evangelism at Wheaton College and an expert in the study of C.S. Lewis and his writings. He offered a series of lectures at the C.S. Lewis Institute which give an overview of the work and a way to understand its meaning for readers. Join us each Wednesday evening we will meet to watch the lecture and have some time for conversation about it.

There are many different editions of *The Screwtape Letters* available in print at Curious Iguana in Frederick, Barnes and Noble, Amazon.com, Cokesbury.com and other booksellers. We will have some copies available for purchase at the church as well. It's not required that you read the book or make all the sessions to participate, but many will want to do so.

Stewardship

Genesis 33:11 "...for God has been gracious to me and I have all I need." How many of us can speak from our heart as Jacob did to his estranged brother, Esau? Jacob left some 20 years earlier with only the blessing of his father, Isaac. During his self-exile, Jacob worked for his uncle Laban, married two of Laban's daughters, had children and grew in material wealth. Jacob counted these as blessings from God. While these blessings were many, Jacob never lost the understanding that it was God who did all this for him. So it was easy for Jacob to acknowledge to Esau that God had given him all that he needed and a third of what he had was his gift to Esau. It may have been a way to assuage any anger that Esau held from the actions of Jacob 20 years earlier.

This gift of material goods could be considered, in a way, a thank offering to God for all God had blessed him with, but given to Esau to make peace. Jacob's thank offering was to atone for the ill that he gave to Esau, usurping Esau's birth right and gaining Isaac's final blessing to his first born (Esau) to Jacob (second born).

"I have all I need" is a recognition of God's blessings to us. Few of today's Christians live that way. We keep working in this world to amass as much wealth as we can – how much is enough? When we cling to this world's values and try to live to its standards, we are living to ourselves and not living for God and relying upon his care.

God blesses us with what we need. He promised to do it, as proves his word is true when he met to the Israelites needs in the wilderness with manna, quail and water from stone. But we do not live today as if what God has given us is the thing that meets our need. We live as if we have decided that we need more than what we have. We live like there is never enough.

This does not mean that we are to discard the idea of working hard to strive to attain a better standard of living. Hard work allows us to not rely solely on the grace and generosity of others. We are not to depend on others but to rely upon God to provide the means by which we better ourselves.

God never intended us to be idlers and dependent upon our neighbor. We need to reverse the weak path for a greater Christian way of working to meet our needs, with a little more than "enough" to meet the needs of other less fortunate neighbors. God's blessing to us are to be our blessing to others. When do we have enough?

Our Altar Call to the Cross ...

In the first chapter of the Gospel of Mark, first by John the Baptist and subsequently by Jesus, we are admonished to repent and give up old ways, for the Kingdom of God is at hand. Sounds easy enough, we might think; but how challenging that calling is if we understand what God is really calling us to do. Such repentance and challenge to change our lives is our calling during the season of Lent, a period of serious reflection on our life's journey in relation to God and our neighbor, a journey that takes us from Jesus' human temptations in the desert to his sacrificial death on a cross for us and our salvation. It is a journey during which we are invited, time and again, to become disciples of Christ. In the parlance of church practices, it is in a sense a time for altar call before God, a period of reflection, repentance, and commitment!

It was about 60 years ago this spring, while stationed with the Navy in San Diego, that I experienced my first public altar call. I was with a group of Methodist men from the church in which my late wife Martha and I were active at the time, attending a spiritual revival in the city's professional football stadium. We and the tens of thousands of others had gone to hear the preaching of an increasingly popular young evangelist by the name of Billy Graham. At the end of his message, as he did in each of his evangelistic missions, he held an altar call ... to which many thousands responded by publicly going forth to commit their lives to Christ Jesus.

For some reason I did not go forth with others that day. I had been baptized, confirmed and raised in a rather conservative culture of the Episcopal church, had been a regular attendee of chapel services throughout my college years (when such was not mandatory), and, though I had become inactive in the life of a church for a few years thereafter, I had married a woman who was a director of Christian education in the Methodist Church, within which we both were subsequently quite active. With this as background, I guess I assumed that because I was already a faithful church member I did not need to go forward that day. I now believe that I was wrong in that assumption, one that was challenged many times over the years whenever I would listen to the Rev. Billy Graham preach on television. He always made a point to emphasize that simply being a church member did not necessarily mean that one had committed his or her life to Christ.

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Our call to become disciples of Jesus, of course, is far more than an altar call. But that is a beginning! What follows is of even greater importance as we acknowledge with the prayerful hope that we practice in our lives what we profess with our lips. In so doing, our walk with Jesus more than likely will be by little steps at a time, learning from His teaching and observing his acts of mercy and justice, then practicing what we have learned and observed with others in small groups of disciples, much as the earliest disciples did themselves. Most of them were likely a bit like most of us, lovingly attentive to Jesus, observant of his many miraculous acts, and even trying to learn about God's Kingdom from his teaching. But as Peter discovered about himself in the courtyard of Jesus' trial, most of us are likely not prepared to totally commit our lives to Jesus' discipleship ... even though professing to do so.


Through His love and grace, however, God did not give up on Peter or the other earliest followers of Jesus who denied or abandoned him during his hours of trial; nor does God give up on us. Rather, He continues to call us to commitment in discipleship with Jesus today. During Holy Week this year, let each of us prayerfully reflect upon what Jesus is calling us to do when he states: "If anyone wants to come with me, he must forget himself, carry his cross, and follow me. For whoever wants to save his own life will lose it; but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it." (Mark 8: 34-35) What will our response be to this altar call to the cross?
