

What does it mean to be United Methodist?

That's a question that has some urgency these days. There are some within the United Methodist Church that have recently taken steps to leave and form a new denomination, some have wondered, "What does it mean to be a United Methodist?" During the pandemic, when many have fallen out of the habit of attending worship in person at a local congregation each Sunday and churches have offered online options, some have wondered, "What does it mean to be a United Methodist?"

To answer that question, let me direct you to what we as the congregation say each time someone is baptized or confirmed:

We will surround these persons with a community of love and forgiveness, that they may grow in their trust of God, and be found faithful in their service to others. We will pray for them that they may be true disciples who walk in the way that leads to life.

and

As members together with you in the body of Christ and in this congregation of the United Methodist Church, we renew our covenant faithfully to participate in the ministries of the Church by our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our witness, and our service that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ.

We proclaim our shared beliefs together with the words of the Apostles' Creed and other historic confessions of faith. We regularly share communion at the Lord's Table, asking God to make us "one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world until Christ comes in final victory and we feast at his heavenly banquet." These words identify us as the body of Christ with others around the world.

As United Methodists, we belong to a particular branch of the family tree. Our Methodist roots go back to John Wesley who was interested in bringing together both a concern for individual piety as well as for social justice. He called people to have a faith in God who is made known in Jesus Christ.

Methodism, at its best, has always allowed for a variety of opinions, styles of worship, and theological perspectives while still being true to the core of Christian belief and practice. The church is richer for having lots of voices and for having room for people to ask questions rather than being a place where there is only one acceptable point of view and everyone must fall in line.

In response to the question, "What is a Methodist?" John Wesley said that Methodists are devoted to God, adore God, rejoice in God, trust in God, pray to God, seek to please God and believe that all scripture is inspired by God. Methodists love people, are pure in heart, do good toward everyone and demonstrates fruits of a living faith.

Wesley also wrote that Methodists do not all think, talk or act the same. We do not focus on a single idea. Our personal opinions do not mark us as Methodists. "We hold to the central teachings of Christianity, but as to all opinions which do not strike at the root of Christianity, we think and let think." (John Wesley, "The Character of a Methodist")

We also can know what it means to be United Methodist through this particular congregation. Here at Calvary United Methodist Church, we know what it is to be United Methodist through a beautiful building and a long history, through individuals and programs and groups that have fed our spirit and shown us what it is to be faithful followers of Jesus Christ. We have been stirred by the music, inspired by the preaching, nurtured by the care of others and taught by many teachers. Although this congregation has its flaws and limitations, it carries the power of the gospel and passes on the good news of Jesus Christ to people every day and every year. For this we can be thankful. And we can renew our promise to God to participate in the ministries of the church "that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ."

For their Sunday School Lenten Mission Project, Calvary's Children's Sunday School classes wanted to raise money to help build beds for children in Frederick County who don't have their own place to lay their heads to sleep. We had heard about *Sleep In Heavenly Peace* through Pat Herber and Helen Sheppard. Mrs. Herber was kind enough to come to our Sunday School class to share all about the program. The kids were immediately excited after hearing Pat's enthusiastic explanation of the Frederick County chapter, and had lots of questions.

We got to work right away collecting coins, dollar bills and checks. People also began sending in beautiful brand-new bedding: unicorn comforters, teddy bear sheets, and fluffy new pillows! The Lux family, who join us for Sunday School on our Zoom link every week from Pennsylvania, sent in an entire box of bedding! Throughout the months of March and April, we also worked on tying soft flannel "rag" blankets to include with all of our new bedding.

We even had the opportunity to visit a couple of the Adult Sunday School Classes to share some posters we made, and we were able to collect even more money for the project. In total, the Children's Sunday School students collected over \$600 and 5 giant laundry baskets filled to overflowing with brand-new bedding! We can't wait to hear how excited and grateful the recipients of these new beds will be!

On June 9, Calvary members will have an opportunity to build beds in Adamstown as a church group. There is a sign up in the Parish Hall, or you can contact Pat Herber or Helen Sheppard. There is an online form to complete before attending. After the beds are built, we will be able to personally deliver some of them – with our own bedding collected by our Sunday School kids! #### From Going to Church to Being the Church ...

As we observe Pentecost, the birth of the Christian church, it seems appropriate to reflect on what the church means. Merriam-Webster defines church as "a building for public and especially Christian worship." Most opinion pollsters, in gauging the extent to which the public is engaged in religious activity, cite frequency of church attendance, a metric that connotes the church being a place while also noting our behavior in relation to that place. While both of these concepts of the church are valid, they are not the whole story for those who follow Christ. In fact, they may miss the point of the Gospel.

The Apostle Paul refers to the church as the body of Christ (1 Cor 12:27) and to Christ as the cornerstone of the church (Eph 2:20). Even Jesus declared that he would build his church upon the rock that was his early disciple Peter (Mt 16:18). Such metaphors imply a spiritual definition of church. Towards that end, it was by power of the Holy Spirit on the first day of Pentecost that the disciple Peter inspired a fellowship of believers to become the first church (Acts 2), a fellowship that abided in Christ's commandment that we love God and love our neighbor, making new disciples as they did so. In other words, as the children's song goes: "I am the church; you are the church; we are the church together!"

If we are the church in fellowship with Christ, empowered by the Spirit of God, are we not also committed to follow the teachings and example of Jesus, whose self-proclaimed mission was to serve, not be served, especially those marginalized by society or otherwise in need? Mark Moore, in his book of weekly scriptural studies *Core 52*, equates loving God with action rather than emotion, action that must move into our communities (p. 211), just as Jesus modeled. The *Social Principles of The United Methodist Church*, derived from the social gospel movement of the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century church, speak to the issues of justice and mercy to which we are called to ministry in the communities about us.

At this time when there is an existential threat to our planet, devastating wars and other hateful practices take place in our world, the human rights of people in our nation are at risk, and just under 40% of the households in our local community cannot afford basic needs in housing, food, child-care and health services, the needs for Christian love abound. Our calling this Pentecost at Calvary is to be the church together, through not only our worship, study, and fellowship, but in extending the love of God through Christ to the communities about us.

Scripture gives us so many wonderful glimpses of the kingdom of God, the people who worshiped him in the Old Testament times, how we worship today, and in the future depicted in Revelation. In all times the worship of God is the same. Psalm 100 is a perfect example of joyful worship expressing thanksgiving and gratitude. This is depicted in verse 4: "Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name." Why is such unbounding joy expressed by the people of God in this Psalm?

It is an expression of great gratitude and acknowledgement of the blessings God has bestowed upon them as individuals and as a people. Stop for a moment and imagine such song and praise. Think of some blessings that are God's gift to you. Is it a loving family and caring friends? Maybe an enjoyable, productive job that allows you the income that meets your needs and even income to achieve some of your wants. God's blessings come to us in many forms, they all allow us to live in peace and security. The security and happiness we seek are blessings from God. It is a truth that all blessings, great and small come from God. Yet, it is something we tend to forget. We lose the attitude of gratitude.

Psalm 100:5 continues, "For the lord is good and his love endures forever; his faith-fulness continues through all generations." God blesses us with all his grace and mercy from the day we were conceived to the day we die to this world. He holds nothing from us. He does not hold back his love, mercy and our way to salvation from any sinner. It is his love for all that he gives the way to eternal life for all who abide in him and believe in his Son, Christ. What reason do we have to not express our gratitude to God in extreme?

How do we show that gratitude and thanks? Read Psalm 100 again in its entirety – it is short. We see an example of heart filled worship of God, singing to him, and praying to him, as you are entering his gate. The gate is to today's Church, it is the gate to kingdom of God that is near and within each Christian, it is the gate to the New Heaven and New Earth. It is the gate to eternity. Gratitude is a key to that gate.

Now turn to 2 Corinthians 9: 6-15. Give to God from what he has blessed you with and as the Holy Spirit guides you. Paul tells us to give without reluctance or compulsion, give with gratitude. Doing this, scripture tells us in many ways our endeavors and faith lives will be successful and abundant. We gain righteousness and Paul says we are enriched in every way, so that your generosity will result in greater and continued thanksgiving. One feeds the other. As you give, you gain, and you move to repeat the cycle because it is all good. Your acts of generosity will be ever increasing, your gratitude will be ever increasing and your life will expand the kingdom at this moment and in the End Times.
