

There are many ways that the people of Calvary United Methodist Church are making a difference in the larger community. Here are a few examples:

- Eric Anderson heads up the <u>Blood Drive</u> for the American Red Cross. There are folks from the church who donate and others who volunteer to check people in, set up the room, and provide food and drinks for the donors. Since the pandemic, each blood drive is actually **two shifts**. This means that Calvary Church is the host and collection site for ten blood drives each year!
- <u>Sleep in Heavenly Peace</u> builds and delivers beds to children who otherwise did not have one. The organization takes raw lumber and creates the bed frames, obtains mattresses and bedding, and sends out crews to deliver and assemble the beds. Calvary UMC has sponsored a "Bed build" in May and provided many volunteers. Then, throughout the summer we send out a crew of four to six people each week to deliver the beds to homes in Frederick County. This delivery has continued.
- In August, we collected school supplies and provide funds for the <u>Stuff the Bus Campaign</u> to provide backpacks and other items to students as they were going back to school.
- In September we sent a group of eight to Eastern Kentucky to work on projects at <u>Henderson</u> <u>Settlement</u>, a mission of the United Methodist Church. And more than \$1,900 in donations has come in to be forwarded to <u>UMCOR</u> for hurricane relief.
- In October we worked with <u>Rise Against Hunger</u> to package 10,000 nutritious, shelf stable meals that can be shipped wherever there is a food emergency. We also raised money for hunger projects through the CROP Walk. The youth here took the lead to keep this activity going.
- This month, we are partnering with <u>SHIP</u> (Student Homelessness Initiative Project) for Frederick County to collect toiletry items for students who are without a permanent home.

I recently participated in an online course that looked at creative ways for churches to do ministries in their local community. I learned that it is helpful to do some intentional listening to those in the neighborhood to get a sense of what the needs are and what sort of things might be missing. I hope to have us take the next step to find ways to offer more to those who are in the area. Loving your neighbor starts right outside your front door.

"Singing in the Spirit"

Everyone is Invited to UMW's Group Hosting of Dr. Adela Peeva

All congregation members, including friends as well, are cordially invited to a special evening event to explore approaches to **Singing in the Spirit**.

On <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>November 16</u>, <u>at 7:00 pm</u> in the Calvary's Ladies Parlor, the United Methodist Women's (UMW) Group will host a discussion with our Music Director and Organist, Dr. Adela Peeva. At this meeting, Dr. Peeva will lead an informal conversation on

"How to sing in the spirit, prayerfully and with conviction."

The conversation will also include singing of hymns, with a guided emphasis on melody and rhythm, in attempting to deeper interpret and enlighten our understanding, experiencing and appreciation of the story behind the hymns' music. Dr. Peeva will also provide some practical suggestions touching on techniques that can be used to enhance how we "*sing in spirit.*"

Church in relation to society: A focus on youth

Mark, the gospel author, was likely a teenager during the time of Jesus' ministries. His mother was an active follower of Jesus and later, as a young adult, he worked closely with and learned from the apostles Peter and Paul. His gospel has been characterized by scholars as focused somewhat more on Jesus' actions in the community, and less on his sayings, though both are contained in his account of Jesus' life. The old saying that "action speaks louder than words" might in fact characterize the youth and young adult years, a time during which we develop a better sense of who we are as individuals and begin to assume more responsibility for our actions in relation to others and the communities in which we live. The outlook of youth and young adults on faith is likely to be captured by the disciple James who shared that his faith is reflected by his actions (Jas 2: 18).

It is also during the teenage years, and especially the early adult years that follow, that young people tend to drop out of active participation in the church, a trend that scholars of church life have documented over the past half century. There are many reasons for this, included among which may be their questioning the relevance of the church in the context of issues and problems that are salient in the local, national, and global communities in which they live. A recent article in the Washington Post (Sept. 17, 2022, p. B2) observes in this context that many are exploring faith traditions other than Christianity. By contrast, Diana Butler Bass, a scholar of American Christian church history, finds many of this younger generation exploring spirituality apart from the traditional church in which many of them grew up, many among these however searching for a more personal relationship with Jesus than they found in the church itself.

At Calvary, we see a paucity of youth and young adults in our worship services. To be sure, a few are serving in our nursery or other helpful roles with our younger children during worship hours. Nonetheless, we do have an active Methodist Youth Fellowship for teenagers of our congregation and their friends that meets every Sunday (early) evening under the able leadership of our Youth Coordinator Jenn Duthoy. Perhaps other than eating and enjoying one another's company, my guess is that their favorite activities are those in which they are serving in some special way those in need within our community. This they have done In association with our pastor and other adults of our congregation through mission trips, CROP walks (as recent as the one on October 23rd), helping build beds for children without their own beds (as they did this past summer), and collecting needed items or gifts for children and youth in need, especially at times such as Christmas (for which Calvary will have opportunities in the next month or two to collect items in need for homeless youth within our community). On Youth Sunday each year, we have the opportunity to observe them leading us in worship, with the more senior among them impressively sharing their faith through actions by personal testimony.

Continued from page 4 As a congregation, we have a responsibility to actively support our youth before they leave us as young adults for college, military or other public service or employment. We made this pledge at the time of their baptism and confirmation. If we have not already done so in various ways, it is time if we are able to put the words of that pledge into action. As adults of our congregation we have many different backgrounds of faith development, careers, and community engagement from which to share with our youth. Jenn Duthoy is always seeking adult volunteers to share an evening or two with our youth, perhaps bringing refreshments but also to share as Christian men and women from our life and faith journeys.

Stewardship

In all we do, waste is not an attribute we want. We look to conserve our time. Doing things that help to get the job done more quickly without forgoing quality. In industry we invent and develop in order to make better products, cheaper and more quickly. We experience "supply chain" issues as products become more complicated – and we make every effort to eradicate bottle necks.

It is the same in our Christian faith. We try to move through our faith life with the least encumbrances and demands upon ourselves. We believe, wrongly, that it is the reality we live in that is the important thing. We have missed the better way by giving the emphasis on worldly matters. We follow the easy way because God, who cares for us will forgive our "little" faults. As a disciple of Christ, this is upside – down.

We need to spend greater conscious effort in being a disciple who is faithful, honest to God and to themselves in their prayers, presence, gifts (read generosity), service and witness.

Your witness is to tell your own story about your relationship with God. God makes you who you are and who you will ever be. You can tell others how sin has passed and been conquered with God in you. Tell what God did to set you free from it. You do not have to rise to the level of prophet, pastor or TV evangelist. You are merely a disciple in training and in witness.

Your presence is your attention to seeking out God. It is the coming into his audience through worship service, reading scripture and other faith writings, studying his word given to you. God's presence will be felt through an open heart and an open mind. It is an attitude of "receptivity to the Holy Spirit". It is your keeping God's presence in your heart.

The final two are not the least of these but are together the most impactful to the world and maybe to yourself. These two, service and gifts, are those qualities that reflect the faith you hold. They are the most visible to the world and others. What you give, your generosity, is demonstrative of how much you appreciate the blessings given to you from God that makes you better, that makes you complete and whole. Generosity and service reveal the depth of your God-man relationship. The world will see your generosity and may well think you the fool. But you do not do gifting and service for their praise but to show them the way to God. It is God who we wish to see our generosity. The same can be said of service.

Serving others is the giving of ourselves is all kind of ways. I have made the two acts of faith the most important because each reflects the depth of faithfulness.

Organ Update

Calvary's new pipe organ build is underway! On October 19 and 20, Joyce and Rob Summers, Pipe Organ Building Committee Chairs, and Adela Peeva, Director of Music and Organist, made a road trip to Denver, NC to visit the Cornel Zimmer Organ Builder Shop. Our first stop was in Winston Salem, NC at First Baptist Church where Zimmer

recently built and installed a new console. We were able to see a completed console and how it is organized, and Adela was able to play the organ and get a good sense of how Calvary's new console will feel. We then visited Zimmer's shop. They provided a tour of their facility and had prepared a mock-up of our console (see details below). We saw our pipes being washed, saw some metal pipes that are more than 100 years that have already been completed restored (they look brand new!), and reviewed the layouts that determine where all the pipes will be placed in our chambers next summer.
