Just a little over 15 years ago, Eric Anderson took over as the coordinator for the American Red Cross Blood drive at Calvary United Methodist Church. Since February 2008, Eric has coordinated what has become the largest site for blood donation in Frederick County, with five drives each year and almost 5,000 units donated. On May 10, he will be coordinating/hosting his 75th drive. He will be stepping aside to take on other responsibilities. His goal during this drive is to hit the goal of 100 units.

Just a 1-2 hour contribution of your time can help save up to 3 people with a single blood donation! Blood supply levels remain critically low, and you can help make a huge difference by signing up for a lifesaving donation. Even if you can't give at this time, you can always invite a friend to donate!

"You must not mistreat or oppress foreigners ..." (Exod 22:21)

In this post-Easter season, we reflect on the powerful message of the Resurrection of Jesus and its meaning for our lives as Christians. The concepts of a new transformed life, God's love conquering evil, and the symbolic escape from forms of slavery, as our Jewish neighbors celebrated in the Passover, a time at which the trial, death, and resurrection of Jesus took place. Little is mentioned in our Scriptures, however, about the horrible conditions of life faced by the Israelites under oppressive Roman rule, even at the time at which Jesus entered Jerusalem to the cries of "Hosanna" (Savior or Save Us) from the crowds of common people gathered along the roadside.

One of the historical themes of the Bible is that of the migration of people from one geographic and cultural location to another, often to escape intolerable conditions of life or at least to seek a better life, and at other times forced by conquering nation states. So common was such migration in the ancient days that Moses, guided by God, spoke to his followers as written in the Book of Exodus (above), repeating that message in Leviticus 19:33-34: "*Do not take advantage of foreigners who live among you; treat them like native born and love them as you love yourself, for you were once foreigners yourself.*" It is from such Old Testament text, also repeated in Deuteronomy 10:19, and their equivalent regarding love for other Israelites as noted in Leviticus 19:18, that Jesus proclaimed the second part of the Great Commandment (Mathew 22:34-40), namely, to love our neighbor. In addition, when asked by a temple scribe, 'who is our neighbor,' it was not by accident that Jesus told the parable in which a Samaritan, an otherwise shunned if not despised neighbor by many Israelites of that day, was the good neighbor! In Ephesians 2:19 and 1 Peter 1:1, the Apostles Paul and Peter pick up on this theme, noting those to whom we may refer as strangers or foreigners (or in today's political language of some, aliens) as also being among all of God's chosen people.

I raise this issue because the story of refugees is one of the great social issues of justice and mercy facing our world today. It is the story of those leaving countries of origin for safety from warfare or other forms of violence, or to escape various conditions of discrimination or persecution, or forced at other times by natural disasters, but in most every instance to seek a new and better life for their family. This is an issue common to the history of our nation, often referred to as "the land of immigrants," an attribute in which we take pride. Yet, paradoxically, we are a nation with a history of xenophobia documented by Erica Lee, professor of history at the University of Minnesota, in her book *America for Americans* (2019).

At the global level, The United Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief (UMCOR) in partnership with Church World Service (CWS) continues to address issues of refugee populations, their care and their placement in new lands. In thinking about these issues within our own local, regional, and national community, I ask myself the following questions. I wonder, for example, what Jesus, with his arms outstretched on the cross, pleading one last time for us to love our neighbor, might say to us about the huddling masses of people seeking asylum on the boundaries of our nation? Where is our Christian faith of new life in Christ at such times that we argue politically but not morally about immigrants in our communities? Where is our sense of justice and mercy for all of God's children as called for in the *Social Principles of the United Methodist Church*? As Christians and American citizens, are we not called to reflect on these and related questions and to act accordingly, bearing in mind that when Jesus spoke of love, He referred to action, not simply an emotion.

Julia Lancione – Soprano "My Choir Journey"

Singing is in my genes. My mother grew up singing and traveled the country for a time with a Catholic singing group called "The King's Minstrels." My dad likes to reminisce about holding me as a baby in a recording studio while my mom sang. Her father, my grandfather, was also a singer and sang on the Baltimore radio in the 1940s. My mom saw talent in me from a young age. She tells me that she realized I could carry a tune at age four– so, she put me in dance class. I've been performing ever since.

As a kid, growing up in Baltimore, I did musicals in school or community theatres. For as long as I can remember, I've wanted to be in Broadway. I attended a performing arts high school where I did even more musicals, sang in choirs, and took private voice lessons. I had amazing teachers who encouraged me to try out for All County and All State Chorus, which I participated in all four years of high school. After graduation, I attended The American Musical & Dramatic Academy in NYC for their two-year conservatory program. I loved living in the city, but at 18, fresh out of high school, I found that an intense program with little performing opportunities just wasn't for me. I transferred my sophomore year to Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, VA where I majored in Musical Theatre. I sang in choirs, took all sorts of drama, music theory, and dance classes. I performed in musicals and plays, and even met my husband, Dan. Transferring was the right choice and I believe a higher power led me to make it.

After graduating with a BFA in Musical Theatre, I booked the Broadway National Tour of "Cats". I got paid to travel all over the US and even to Santiago, Chile and Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paul, Brazil. When that ended, I worked for regional theatres including Olney Theatre Center and Toby's Dinner Theatre in Columbia, MD. Several years later, I booked another Broadway National Tour, this time the musical version of "The Addams Family." Again, I got paid to travel and perform all over the US and Asia. We played Singapore, Hong Kong, Macau, Guangzhou (China), and on a break I took a trip to Beijing with friends where I got to walk The Great Wall! I never imagined that I'd get to see so many cultures and people. I believe travel really does change your world view. I will always be grateful for the wonderful opportunities I've had.

I was raised Catholic. I did my First Communion, Penance, and Confirmation, but never felt a connection to the church. Those things were just something you did because you were Catholic. Your parents did them and their parents did them and so on. I never believed that the only way to speak to God was through a Priest, that a Priest had to be male, or that praying the rosary would absolve me of my sins. As an adult I explored different denominations. I sang in a contemporary Christian group at a non-denominational church in college, but realized it was too modern for me. Dan was raised Presbyterian and upon moving to Frederick, we started attending services at Frederick Presbyterian. This wasn't a great fit either. We couldn't find our place. It wasn't until we were looking for a place to baptize our son, Gabriel, that we came to Calvary. We immediately felt welcomed even though we had never attended service here. We started coming weekly, put Gabriel in Sunday school, and eventually decided to become members. So here we are! Did ya hear the one about the Catholic and the Presbyterian who ended up in a Methodist church?

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Dan encouraged me to inquire about singing. I was reluctant at first because there wasn't a choir then because of Covid and I hadn't really sung since before I had our son. The choir started back up and I joined. I've enjoyed meeting the other members and Adela is truly a gift! I love coming to rehearsal each week and learning new music with other singers who have a passion for glorifying God through song. I'm grateful to get to sing challenging classical works by Mozart and Handel, which I haven't done since college,

In conclusion, Dan and I like it here. I hope that Gabriel pursues his musical talents as well. He is constantly drumming and really does have rhythm. We got him a drum set for set his birthday and are slowly going deaf. But seriously, we love that Gabriel is being raised in a church that welcomes all people, has a great youth program, and is focused on fellowship and missions. Did God lead us here to find our place? I think so.

Stewardship

It is hard to change something you have been doing a long time. It is hard to quit – smoking, biting your nails, going on a diet. Anything that has become a habit, some good, some bad but both are hard to break or change. When we do it all at once, it is called "going cold turkey" and we are not too successful in making the change long lasting.

Jesus knew this to be truth of human nature when he spoke of "storing up" treasure in Matthew 6: 10-24. I know this is a different view of this parable. But look at it from the pack side. The treasure Jesus was referring to was that of heaven as opposed to treasure on earth, material goods. As important as this is, the act of "storing UP' is also important. We do not do it once and done, we do it every day and every moment.

We learned in our youth that gratification for something was often delayed, Large and expensive things took time and a steady effort to achieve. Think of higher education, new home, retirement or car. There is always a loan from the bank to achieve an item in the now. But to have full ownership you still have to work and pay for it. In each phase we go step-by-step with small acts of achievements toward the bigger from the lesser.

So it is with our living into an eternal life. Jesus spoke of doing good and being righteous, not once but doing good daily and often. Look at the encounter of Jesus tells of the Rich Ruler (Matt 19: 16-25). The Rich Ruler asks "what good thing must I do to get eternal life" (v. 6). This man was looking for a quick fix to his question (or problem) and Jesus answered him by keeping God's commandments. God's commandments must be kept without any concept of once and done. It is a habit that is kept at an internalized level. In the end the Rich Ruler needed to change a wrong habit of self to a righteous habit of caring for others. While portrayed as a single act of change, in reality it is a change of life.

Coming to worship service on Sunday morning is not the single act of righteousness required. Acting and feeling like you are attending worship every day and every moment, do good whenever the opportunity occurs is what is required.
