## Tribute to John Slovikosky

Reader's Digest used to have a feature called, "The Most Unforgettable Character I've Ever Met." For me, that character is John Slovikosky.

I met John in the fall of 2019 when I joined the Sanctuary choir. While I personally knew just a few people in the choir, I knew of many others, including John, having sat a few pews behind him in the summers. We bonded quickly in choir rehearsals, and we joked, laughed, and might have had more fun than anyone else. He often told me he had sung this anthem or that anthem before, and just needed a quick refresh to be ready. He always got a kick out of randomly picking up a copy of an anthem only to find his own notes written in pencil from many years before.

John also educated me on the history of Calvary Choirs, and many former choir members. He spoke so lovingly and glowingly of Lori Shipley, and he poignantly showed me one anthem where Lori's hand-written notes were still there. He also was quick to jump in and help when I got frustrated with the music, or the phrasing, or anything else - his smile and reassuring words always gave me more confidence in what we were doing.

As I got to know John better, we talked about many other topics - the church in general, mission projects, music, current events, our children, and grandchildren ... the list goes on and on. During one conversation, after we exchanged thoughts and ideas for several minutes, John said, "Here's the thing ..." and proceeded to offer the best insight and guidance I could have asked for, along with his wonderful and amazing wit and sense of humor. In every conversation after that one, I eagerly awaited him to say, "Here's the thing ..." because I knew I was about to hear understanding, wisdom, empathy, and another side to what we were discussing.

And his grandkids – oh my. He loved his grandkids so very much. The mention of their activities or accomplishments, or an upcoming trip with them, made his eyes light up. He was so excited this spring when he got to pick up one granddaughter from college, then take another granddaughter to Dover for a NASCAR race.

John loved life as much or more than anyone I have ever known. His smile and laugh immediately put anyone at ease, and he treated everybody like they were his best friend. I miss him terribly, but I am comforted with wonderful memories, and I will always remember – and carry with me – the many lessons he taught me.

## Church and Society

### *First Principles ...* Summertime Reflections

Taking a lead from Pastor Steve's recent sermon series on ages and stages of our lives and faith journeys, when I was a boy summertime meant no school, playing ball and swimming, family picnics, and maybe a vacation for a week or so away from home. At my present stage of life and reflections, however, summertime is a season bounded by Memorial Day and Labor Day, with July 4<sup>th</sup> as nearly a mid-point, national holidays on which we are reminded of the sacrifice and principles that undergird our nation's history, with all its blemishes and achievements.

Thomas Ricks, in his book *First Principles* (2020), speaks to such matters in writing about our nation's first four presidents. Among them Thomas Jefferson and James Madison, respectively, are regarded as the principal architects of our nation's *Declaration of Independence* and *United States Constitution*, in

which are inscribed the principles on which our democratic republic was founded. Though our nation's founders differed in their backgrounds and philosophies of government, there was a sense of civility and respect, a sense of moral character among them, such that they were able to frame the basis on which we were to govern. Today, in the wake of the vitriolic political climate in our nation, the prejudice, threats and acts of violence in our communities, and the frequent refusal of too many elected officials even to address problems related to the very foundations and future of our nation, I am concerned about our moral compass.

Jesus also had something to say about first principles as our life compass. He began his Sermon on the Mount with the edict "blessed are the poor in spirit" (Mt 5:3), interpreted by biblical scholars as an utter sense of humility before God. As Richard Rohr puts it: "It's inner emptiness with no outer need for our own reputation" (*Jesus' Alternative Plan*. 2022, p. 138). For only then are we able to

love God and our neighbor, even our enemy, as Jesus also commanded. A thirst for justice, mercy and righteousness follow, as Jesus preached and the prophet Micah (6:8) among others proclaimed.

So, as the fireworks are displayed and we share God's love with family, friends, and those less fortunate, as some of our youth and adults will be doing in mission to those in Appalachian Kentucky this summer, let us also pray for our country to be in search of its soul, its first principles, its moral compass.

## Stewardship

“You are the salt of the earth.”

Matthew 5: 13. These words, from Jesus, describe a valued quality of his disciples. He says these words closely following the Sermon on the Mount. This sermon is in the same chapter and it further lists qualities of disciples; poor in spirit, those who mourn, the meek, and more. “You are the salt of the earth” is a shift from blessings given in the Sermon to responsibilities of a disciple.

As used by Jesus, being “salt” is a quality that holds responsibility, it is different. It is a metaphor for what is expected of Christians. I can remember the term being “salt” had a meaning of being a little rough in character, language and demeanor. In Jesus’ time it did not hold such meaning and was viewed as having more beneficial qualities.

To the people of that time salt was hard to come by. So it had economic value. It was mostly from the Red Sea and contained a lot of impurities. But it was a means to purify something: it was used to kill bacteria in treating wounds. It was used as a preservative of food at a

time of no refrigeration (snow from the highest mountains). It prevented spoilage and rot in food. It was used in food flavoring as we do today. Salt and being salt of the earth are good qualities.

Being a disciple of Jesus is more than listening as a student, being a disciple is a person of action and responsibility. We are to purify others in the world who are in sin by living a righteous life. We open ourselves to others to emulate us as we follow Christ. We share the word of God and Christ’s teachings. We are purifying and healing in the name of Christ.

As salt of the earth we prevent the spoiling and rot of the body and soul of those not in Christ and who are without God. It is in the word of God and the work of the Holy Spirit through us that this is accomplished.

We preserve the commands of God, held in our hearts by making them known to the “poor in spirit” and “those who mourn.” We are merciful to others of this world because we have been shown mercy. We are the disciples who

preserve the kingdom and its world of creation. We are love of God in action.

Do we give flavor – yes! Those of the world not in a relationship with God often lead a life of little purpose, relying upon their own means to exist in a hostile world. Studies have shown this to be the curse of life without God. Through us, God can call unbelievers to live a life in peace and joy at a higher level than they have hoped but longed for. We have a responsibility to do this as a Christian and disciple of Jesus.

Jesus has a warning for us. He asks if we lose our saltiness, “how can we be made salty again”? If the good quality is lost, we like salt, have no value to anyone and little value to God. So the question is what is your value to this world as God’s kingdom? Can you be called “the salt of the earth”? Do you exemplify the disciple qualities that Jesus speaks of to you? Disciples are people in action.
