

General Conference 2024

The United Methodist Church will hold its denomination wide meeting, known as the General Conference, April 23-May 3 in Charlotte, NC. This will be the first regular meeting of the General Conference since 2016 and the first time the General Conference has met since the special session held in 2019. This is the one body that speaks for the UMC as a whole, setting mission priorities, church structure, and budgets for the church around the world. This is a particularly important session with three major matters on the table:

- 1. **Regionalism.** The creation of four regional bodies within the denomination that would allow the church the flexibility to shape church decision-making and practices more in line with the cultural and geographical contexts that differ from region to region. The issues that matter in Africa will be different from those in Europe, the United States, and the Philippines. These are four geographical regions roughly equal in size in the UMC. The current structure already allows greater flexibility in the UMC outside the US. This would be creating a similar way for the UMC in the US to have some flexibility and distinctiveness that fits within its own context.
- 2. The Removal of Restrictive Language. The current language in the United Methodist Book of Discipline regarding homosexuality has driven the disaffiliation movement within the church. Removing this language can give local congregations, annual conferences and jurisdictional conferences more latitude for speaking about these issues and finding constructive ways to find agreement.
- 3. **Financial adjustments/cuts.** The United Methodist Church is shrinking in terms of membership and financial contributions. This means that drastic cuts are needed in the funds that support bishops, boards and agencies and the major projects that the denomination has supported, including Africa University. This contraction has been taking place for some time but was greatly accelerates with the COVID pandemic.

Responses by members of Cornel Zimmer Organ Builders to interview questions from Dr. Adela Peeva, Calvary's Music Director

Hopefully, those of you who read the responses by Mr. Aaron Pannebaker, vice-president of the Cornel Zimmer Organ Company in our March newsletter, found them interesting and informative. To learn even more about the building of Calvary's new Pipe Organ from other members of the Organ building team, here are the responses from Mr. Will Burton Edwards and Mr. Jacob W. Hill (Jake) to my questions:



Adela Peeva: Will, please share your experiences building Calvary's Organ so far? What were the most exciting and the most challenging elements for you?

Will Burton - Edwards: Personally, I am responsible for repairing the old pipework and building the racks that supports them on the wind chests. Calvary's pipe organ posed some unique challenges in terms of spacing. The previous instrument was clearly quite large, and the additions required some engineering discipline to fit and still leave room for a tuner to access everything in the chambers.

Adela Peeva: Will, every organ is a unique instrument. What makes Calvary's organ a very special one we should be proud of?

Will Burton- Edwards: The casework! Your church is beautiful and full of interesting little details mimicked in the case. Most of the detail mimics the hand-carved reredos, but elements of the rear of the sanctuary also tie-in. Aaron, Cornel and Jeff did most of the woodwork while Jake and I stained it. You should feel especially proud though of the expressive range of this instrument. With the shades closed, the strings are barely audible and the 16' tuba can pierce through the thong of full congregational singing.

Adela Peeva: Jake, you are an organ technician and also an organist. You work at Cornel Zimmer Organ Builders in addition to your role as a principal organist at First Baptist Church of Winston-Salem, North Carolina. What do you think makes Calvary's Pipe Organ a masterpiece?

Jacob W. Hill: The casework for Calvary's organ is undoubtedly striking! There are many ways to classify objects or things as a masterpiece, but visual beauty is easy for everyone to interpret and appreciate, not just musicians. That alone give the organ a characteristic that not every organ has which helps to set it apart from others, thus elevating it to a "masterpiece" level.

Adela Peeva: Please tell us how your technical knowledge of and experience in organ building contribute to your organ performance?

Jacob W. Hill: I think this question is more applicable in the reverse- my training as an organist helps to inform my work with the organ company. Understanding organ literature from all the major periods in music history is helpful for knowing just what an organ needs to have to be successful. Larger organs are always easier to design, tonally, than the smaller ones where you can't have one of everything. In especially those instances it is good to know the must-have stops as opposed to the nice-to-have stops.

Adela Peeva: What would your dream organ would look like?

Jacob W. Hill: I'm not one to easily identify a singular "dream organ". I find great significance in authenticity, especially as it relates to architecture and instruments throughout history. I guess my dream organ would refer to many organs- all richly preserved from their initial installation, unaltered so that you can experience the thrill of the organ how the builder intended it originally.

Stewardship Notes:

The rising sun can be seen from only one set of windows at my house. So to witness and enjoy God's wonder, I have to be at the right place and at the right time. These two facts cause me to focus and be intentional in the moment that leads to a time of that is inspired worship.

First about the sun rise, it is so spectacular most mornings that there are few words to describe it. It is worship of God's greatness and a joyous prayer given in deep humility. Only God can create such wonder. If that is not in itself an intense moment in worship, it engenders faithfulness in response to God's promises fulfilled. It inspires me to think about how I can return to God what has been given to me and spend the day in continued worship by doing the will of God by doing good to others.

Back to the sun rise. The colors that God paints across the horizon are uncommon, pink, red, orange and yellows. Common is not the word after God finished his daily painting in pastel – each is rare and will never be duplicated. Each is a pearl found in a field. This is on a cloud free, clear day.

Some mornings are not cloudless. Some days there are clouds that cover some of the rising sun. This is a metaphor for our lives. Clouds can allude to ills and woes as depicted in Scripture. Our lives are lived in this world of bedevilment. But, behind the clouds there is God's promise of the sun.

I have noticed that most days with clouds accompanying the sun rise are even more spectacular. The colors are more vibrant pastels. The colors may include a darker blue, purple, reds and oranges. I have seen a green hue on an occasion. These remind me of God's presence in our darkest times. In the face of cloud ridden days, God is still with us and his presence is felt more.

On cloudy days I begin the day with a greater attitude of reflecting God's goodness in my life. These days are special, the sun rise is rarer and more spectacular in the presence of God. Even on cloudy days you experience the presence of your creator. So, your day may be cloudy, it may be cloudy for someone else. Be the person who parts the clouds for another as God parts the clouds for you.

"Changing lives now and for eternity" ...

... a mission statement on the website of the Frederick Rescue Mission ... seems especially timely as we enter this post-Easter period of our faith tradition. An inspiring feature of the Rescue Mission's monthly newsletter is the testimony of one among the many whose lives have been changed through the organization's ministry in the community. As I read them, I am reminded of how powerful the earliest testimonials to the Risen Christ were among Jesus' initial followers and others, as referred to by Luke in the first paragraphs of his gospel and the Book of Acts. Moreover, just as the multiple reappearances in body of the resurrected Jesus, and eventually the Holy Spirit, gave impetus for the witness of His earliest followers, those who serve as staff and volunteers at the Rescue Mission also give witness to their life changing faith as well

Located on West South Street, around the corner from the Religious Coalition, the Rescue Mission now in its 60th year has a number of ministries complementary to the Coalition's focus on homelessness and affordable housing needs in Frederick County. It provides breakfast and lunch for those in need 365 days a year. It also houses a live-in full life recovery program for men suffering from life debilitating addiction, as it also sponsors a safe life changing residential program for abused women, with and without children, through the Faith House ministry. Also sponsored by the Rescue Mission are a food pantry, a clothing distribution center, a learning center, spiritual outreach groups, and a summer camp program. Each of these ministries operates through a staff coordinator and volunteers.

A few months ago, I posted a notice in the newsletter for small groups of Calvary folks (perhaps 6-12 in number) to contact me if their group might wish to sign up as a group for volunteering service at the Rescue Mission. That invitation remains. But there are other ways in which each of us as individuals can also help the Rescue Mission meet its mission goals, financial or otherwise. I would invite you to go to the Mission's website for information and guidance in that regard. Let us continue to be a witness to the Risen Christ through our active ministries of justice and mercy as Jesus taught and modeled, even as He humbly went to the cross.
