

From Pastor Steve

I found attending the annual session of the Baltimore Washington Conference to be an uplifting experience. I found many other clergy and laypeople that make up the 594 congregation of the United Methodist Churches in our conference to be hopeful about the future. The challenges we face are real. Many of the resources and ways that got us to where we are today may not be sufficient to move us forward into tomorrow. But time again in the Bible we see examples of God doing a new thing and inviting people to step out in new ways. And when they do, God provides them guidance and strength.



In a world were there is so much division and acrimony, those who follow Jesus Christ can practice a more excellent way, the way of love.

I want to always proclaim a gospel of grace. Grace was at the heart of John Wesley's understanding and practice of faith. That means that all persons are created in the image of God, beloved and worthy. When we look at one another, we are to see each other in this way. That means we have to let go of labels and categories that say that some people are worthy less than others. Jesus said "love your neighbor as yourself" and "Love one another as I have loved you." There isn't room for exceptions or qualifications.

The sign out front of the church now reads "Everyone is welcome here." We offer an open table for all to receive communion. I'd like us to do our best to make everyone experience a warm welcome when they step inside the church.

I shared with many of you after the worship service on Sunday, June 2 that I plan that explore what this means in our life together. The Church Council met the following evening and agreed to support this. During the summer, a team will come together to consider what it would mean for us to become a reconciling congregation. This will involve lots of prayer, reflection, conversation and careful listening across the whole congregation. The process will allow us to consider just who we are and how we want to be known to our neighbors. I hope you will take part in it. I want this to be a transparent and open process that we can all support.

They always enjoy the Coffee/Donut Hour in the Parish Hall and sit in the front on the left during worship services.



We use the Calvary bus to pick them up each Sunday and drop them off back at their homes after the donut time.

The one driver that we do have needs some additional driver[s] for the Sundays that he is not available. We do not want to have to cancel a Grateful Hearts class on a Sunday because we have no driver.

We are their church home. They look forward to coming to our beautiful building and watching the pageantry, listening to the music from our newly refurbished organ, our wonderful choir and the sermons and scripture readings. They do listen and take it all in-

most of them are very responsive in class, but all of them are happy to be there!!

Our staff and volunteers are supporting multiple Community Classes in person and through distance learning platforms, while tutors from our Tutoring Program meet weekly with their students in person and online to support their learning. SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE

During May, Calvary sponsored two bed build events, May 9th and May 18th, resulting in over 50 beds being built. On May 9th, we had 45 volunteers and station mentors (CUMC folks with previous experience) and we built 20 beds. Our CUMC delivery team has already given all 20 to local children, complete with new bedding. Since our members became involved over three years ago, many CUMC members have helped the local Frederick County Chapter of Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) ensure that No Kid Sleeps on the Floor in Our Town. Your donations (both financial and donations of bedspreads/quilts, pillows, twin sheets, mattress protectors), your labor building beds, hauling beds, mattresses, and recycling, delivering beds and helping pick up, sort and prepare bedding bundles as well as providing storage space in the garage and in the Education building has been an incredible benefit to SHP. This was our third year sponsoring a build and this year we funded the 20 bed May 9th build as well as most of the May 18th build with the help of the Charles and Lucille Main Grant awarded for this purpose through the Community Foundation. The May 18th build was a community build allowing volunteers including a group of girl scouts and several of our CUMC young adults to come out and build.

Standing the watch ... a renewed opportunity for ministry at Calvary

At the conclusion of the memorial service observing the 80th anniversary of D-Day on the 6th of June, held on the hallowed grounds above Omaha Beach of Normandy, a Navy chaplain read *The Watch*, citing the naval tradition of "standing the watch" at sea and ashore. To the century-old WW II veterans seated behind her, she poignantly concluded to the effect: "You stood the watch; you are relieved of the watch; now we stand the watch." From one generation to the next, responsibility, integrity, sacrifice, and service are core values of "standing the watch."

Though his disciples could not stay awake on the eve of Jesus' arrest in Gethsemane. as he had commanded when he said "stay here and keep watch with me" (Mk 14:34), was he not asking them once again to stand the watch for him in his parting comments following the resurrection (Mt 28:18-20)? Had he not symbolically implied the same earlier in his command that to be his disciple one must take up their cross to follow him (Mk 8:34)?

And just as the rationale and procedures for standing the watch in naval tradition are provided as guidance to those in military service with such responsibility, was there not such rationale and guidance given by Jesus to us as it was to his earliest followers if we are to stand the watch as his disciples? Jesus, of course, gave us the Great Commandment, to love God and our neighbor (Mk 12:29-31). Jesus' myriad teachings about how that is to be done might be summarized by the prophet Micah's proclamation to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God (Mic 6:8). This is what I understand to be the focus of the church's relation to the society in which it serves as the hands, feet, heart, and voice of Jesus: responsibility for *justice* and mercy ministries.... humbly serving God.

Following the pandemic at Calvary we combined the planning for these two equally important ministry emphases into one *Missions and Outreach Ministry Team*. With about a dozen members under the superb leadership of Pat and Dave Herber, that team has greatly expanded the opportunities for Calvary's congregation, adults and youth alike, to be informed about and participate in mercy ministries within our local, national, and global societal context.

Less systematic attention, however, has been given to issues of justice in our society or world, many of which are the root cause of the needs for mercy. If we are to take up our cross to follow Jesus and stand the watch for him, we are called to promote justice in our society just as we are to help others with acts of mercy. This is our time to "stand the watch" for Jesus! Beginning in September this year, with the help of a small steering team, we are revitalizing a social and environmental justice ministry at Calvary one that will complement, not compete with, our Missions and Outreach Ministries Team.


