From the Pastor

Every one of us will die one day. Deep down, we all know that to be true. Here is something we may not have considered. Most of us will be richer on that day than we ever where while we were alive. Not only will we be the direct beneficiaries of a gracious and loving God, but we also quite likely will have more money to our name on that day than at any other time. On that day we will no longer have any need of the assets we have accumulated throughout our life. And we may have life insurance benefits coming in after years of monthly premiums going out.

There is some good news and some bad news. The bad news is that none of those riches will be going with you. You will be gone. The good news is that you aren't going to need those riches anyway. Before that day comes, we might do well to stop and consider what God might want us to do with what we leave behind.

They practiced generosity and faith through their offering of their time and financial contributions while they lived. By including the church in their estate plans, they also made it a gift to support the church after they were gone.

It may be including a bequest in your will, including the church as a beneficiary in a life insurance policy, setting up a trust or giving appreciated stock. You can talk with your estate planner to learn about the options and what might be best for you.

Memorial Room Rehab

After years of diligent sorting of boxes and boxes of historic materials by Fred Schumacher followed by cleaning and organizing by Melissa Rust, and Karen & Ray Gebhart the Memorial Room on the 2nd floor is ready for use.

Many treasures, memorabilia and artifacts were discovered. They have been carefully placed in the showcases. Historic wall art and church building items were hung on the walls or placed in areas for full view.

Once the books, ledgers and binders were sorted, those of most historic value dating back to the 1800's were placed in clear bags for preservation and set on the bookshelves. Memorabilia documents from the very first church were placed in a drawer in the bookcase for safe keeping.

From Policy to Practice: A Process of Reconnecting

Earlier this year the world-wide General Conference of The United Methodist Church (UMC) made historic changes in policy related to church organization and more accepting language in the *UMC Book of Discipline* related *to our LGBTQ* brothers and sisters and restrictions on their ministry in the UMC. The latter action, sought by many for decades, now renders greater validity to the UMC evangelistic banner of being a church with "open hearts, open minds, and open doors." To maintain open doors is relatively easy; for hearts and minds to be open, however, often requires more time through a process of human connection …or, for broken relationships, reconnection or reconciliation. It is for such a process that the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN) of United Methodist groups and congregations has functioned since 1983 to support full inclusion of all people in the life of the church, regardless of sexual orientation and gender identity.

Subsequent to the General Conference, and the annual meeting of our Baltimore-Washington Conference, Pastor Steve challenged us through a series of sermons focused on Peter to reflect on what it means to be a disciple of Jesus, a journey of faith, sacrifice, and love in our relationships with God and one another. The Gospel of John (15:1-17) reminds us that only as we remain connected to Jesus, as a branch to the vine, can we truly realize such relationships. Yet, as the Rev. Dr. Ray Moreland reminded us on a recent Sunday, for many reasons we seem increasingly disconnected from one another in the spirit of love to which Jesus calls us. Thomas Merton, a 20th century Trappist Monk, wrote in *No Man Is An Island (1955)* that Jesus' commandment that we love one another as ourselves is the fundamental law of human existence; that it is only through such human connections, as it is spiritually with God, that we come to understand who we are, ourselves.

And how does such a connection begin? I submit that it begins with listening! Being open to hearing the stories of others with an attitude of respect for them as children of God. Eminent psychologist Carl Rogers' theory of counseling is based on the principle of empathy, of listening, affirming, and gaining an understanding of the world from the perspective of others. To that end, following Moreland's message a week later, the Rev. Vicky Starnes shared with us her experience in pastoring gay and lesbian brothers and sisters in the last parish she served, a process of respectful listening that allowed her to learn about their faith journeys in a cultural climate of frequent rejection, even within the church. Taking a lead from the Gospel of Luke (7:1-10), about the unexpected faith of the Roman centurion who asked Jesus to heal his slave, Rev. Starnes reminded us that we should never make assumptions about others until we know their stories.

In the church year ahead, with approval of the Church Council and support of Pastor Steve, a laity leadership team co-chaired by Norma and Jim Hamilton, with Rev. Vicky serving as a resource guide, will invite our Calvary congregation to engage in a process of listening to one another within the framework of the Reconciling Ministry Network. Building upon the strength of faith and mission already present among our congregation, it will be a process designed to prayerfully open each of our hearts and minds as well as our church doors to all people, in the spirit of hospitality to all of God's children, thus moving us from policy to practice in Christian love.

WASH Program Newsletter Article

For many years Calvary UMC has been involved in mission outreach activities seeking to answer Christ's call to care for the needy. In recent years our focus has been on projects at the national or local levels such as mission trips to the Henderson Settlement in Kentucky, building beds for young people through the Sleep in Heavenly Peace program, or collecting food, clothing, and school supplies for distribution within Frederick County. At a Mission and Outreach Committee meeting in February, Pastor Steve asked us to consider taking on a project with international scope. He provided examples of clean water projects in Africa with a three year commitment for monetary support. The committee liked this idea and decided to examine projects sponsored by the UMC Global Ministries organization under its Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) program. This program has organizational and funding infrastructure in place to support its many varied projects throughout the world. The following from the Global Ministries web site describes the overall WASH mission objective.

Access to safe drinking water and basic sanitation and hygiene facilities remains out of reach for billions of people worldwide. Global Ministries believes that access to Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) services is a basic human right and is committed to improving health and wellbeing in underserved and marginalized communities. In collaboration with both Methodist and ecumenical partners, Global Ministries increases access to clean and safe water; revitalizes sanitation facilities and shares knowledge on sanitation and waste management; and helps to reduce infection from preventable, water-borne diseases by enhancing the quality of care in health facilities.

The committee researched various WASH projects with a focus on those in Africa. We learned of an existing project in Burundi in central Africa that is being supported by another UMC congregation in Georgia. This project was very attractive to us since it involves working with a United Methodist missionary in country who is also employed as the Health Operation Manager of the Burundi Annual Conference. He is coordinating construction of a borehole (well) to provide a source of clean water to a village that lacked this capability. Our thought was to partner with this congregation to help fund an additional three wells needed by the village. We recently learned that construction of the additional wells has been put on hold pending completion of a needs assessment by the missionary requested by the conference. The committee therefore decided to contribute \$5,000 from our Missions Trust Fund to the WASH general program where it can be put to immediate use where most needed.

We hope that this outreach initiative will provide an opportunity for all Calvary UMC members, including our young people, to become involved with this very worthwhile international mission project. It will require ongoing fundraising efforts, and we have repurposed our annual CROP Walk to be a WASH Walk and will dedicate funds raised to the WASH program. We anticipate holding additional fundraising projects in the future and hope our church family will be generous in their support as they have in all our mission outreach projects in the past. After Jesus arose from the dead, he appeared to his disciples and told Peter to "Tend my sheep." Here's another opportunity for us to do likewise!
