

From the Pastor

It was about thirty-six years ago. I was the young Associate Pastor of Calvary United Methodist Church serving in my first appointment. I was given the responsibility to teach the confirmation classes along with David Coakley, the Director of Christian Education at that time. The first class I taught included seven students: Ann Hartley, Stephanie Sharpe Slovikosky, Becky Keeny, Amanda Kellam, Stephen Miller, Becky Sheppard Crum, and Jenn Austin Duthoy. It was a fun experience (at least for me) as we got to know each other and talk about what it means to follow Jesus Christ and belong to the church. Some of those students are still active at Calvary UMC all these years later and some have children of their own.

This spring, I am teaching what will most certainly be the last confirmation class I lead. There are three students this time: Malachi O'Toole, Connor Radcliffe and Aubrey Greaves. We use the Bible together and learn about God, Jesus Christ, the community of faith, and Christian discipleship. Each student is matched up with a mentor in the congregation who will have some conversation with them about their own practice of faith and what it means to worship and be in service to others. We look at the ways in which the church talks about God and God's love and grace, especially made evident in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The confirmation classes provide an opportunity to explore what it means to be a person of faith and a follower of Jesus Christ today. At the end of our sessions, each student will be given the opportunity to consider the promises that were made on their behalf when they were baptized and decide if they wish to make their own personal confession of faith. We plan to have a service of confirmation take place on the day of Pentecost, Sunday, June 8.



FAQ on Reconciling Ministry at Calvary

What is Reconciling Ministries Network or RMN?

Reconciling Ministries Network is a growing movement of United Methodist individuals, groups, churches, and campus ministries working for the full participation of all people in the United Methodist Church to transform our Church and world into the full expression of Christ's inclusive love. Established in 1984, RMN works for full equality in membership, ordination, and marriage for God's LGBTQ children. There are over 1,000 Reconciling Ministries and over 43,000 Reconciling United Methodist individuals. There are other networks with similar goals present in other denominations.

What does it mean to be a "Reconciling Church or Congregation?"

A Reconciling Church is one that embraces, affirms, and works for the full participation of all people in the United Methodist Church, including full equality in membership, ordination, and marriage for God's LGBTQ children. Reconciling churches/congregations make a public declaration welcoming all persons, regardless of sexual orientation, to participate fully in its congregational life, and they work for change within the denomination for full inclusiveness and equal rights and privileges for all.

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How does a church become a "Reconciling Church or Congregation?

In order to become a Reconciling Church or Congregation, a church must:

- engage in a study and discernment process
- hold a congregational vote to adopt the Reconciling Statement provided by the RMN with 75% margin of approval
- and affiliate with the RMN local chapter.

Aren't we already a welcoming congregation? Why is this step needed?

In one sense, yes, we are a welcoming church and we include all people in our ministries and programs. But there are some LGBTQ persons who have experienced blatant discrimination, hurt, and even abuse within the church, both in general and specifically at Calvary UMC.

The overwhelming perception within the LGBTQ Community is that the church generally is not a safe and welcoming place for them.

Becoming a reconciling congregation provides a clear statement to non-heterosexual people that they are welcome here. It says that we are intentionally working to undo perceptions and behaviors that treat some people as less than other people. By stating who we are and who we wish to be, we can break down some of the fear and perception that many have about what they might find here. In addition, our United Methodist Book of Discipline had statements actively not welcoming LGBTQ folks for 40 years and prohibiting them from full welcome and inclusion in the life of the church. Now those harmful words have been removed.

Is a Wedding Policy for same-sex couples in The Book of Discipline. Why do we need a separate policy?

In the current (2024) United Methodist Church Book of Discipline, there is no policy regarding the use of the church buildings for weddings. This is a matter that is up to each church. Up until 2024, a United Methodist pastor performing a wedding of a LGBTQ couple on or off the church property could be subject to disciplinary action from the Annual Conference and the denomination.

Calvary UMC does have written guidelines and policies for weddings. These were written by the pastor and reviewed by the Church Council and Board of Trustees. They are available on the church website and in the church office.

Calvary UMC policy does not specifically address the use of the building in the celebration of a same sex marriage. It would be helpful for the Church Council and Board of Trustees to have a formal position on this matter. Without an explicit statement regarding the church's position, the assumption of a non-member would likely be that the church would not allow such a ceremony to take place in the sanctuary or chapel.

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What happens if the church makes/adopts a policy that goes against the conference? Would there be "retribution" towards us?

A United Methodist Church now has the authority to adopt policies with regard to this matter. There is no conference policy on this matter which could be violated.

Will the pastor be meeting/counseling with the LGBTQ couple (as with other couples) and using his/her discretion in officiating/agreeing to the union.

The pastor has discretion to set up conditions or expectations for any couple that he or she plans to marry. This includes pre-marital counseling and planning. The decision to perform the ceremony shall be the right and responsibility of the pastor.

How will allowing same-sex marriage at Calvary and becoming Reconciling affect our membership?

There will be some people who will find relief and a greater sense of welcome here if the church decides to adopt either of these steps. There will likely be additional persons in the community who would consider becoming members here if the position of the church were clearly stated as welcoming in this way. Some churches in downtown Frederick grew in the size of their active membership when they became an open and affirming congregation. It is hard to know ahead of time just what the net impact of this decision might be. That is part of the reason the Reconciling Ministry Team put out this survey to the congregation.

We do know that some members have previously left because they did not feel that the church was a safe and accepting place for themselves, for their friends or for family members in the LGBTQ community. At the same time, some church members have left over the last five years because they were convinced that Calvary UMC was already departing from their views on this matter. So there might be some members of the congregation who will find their own views on same sex marriage and becoming reconciling at odds with Calvary UMC making that choice. Some of these members might feel so strongly about this matter they will leave the church and find another faith community that has policies more to their liking.

Ultimately, there are potential costs and benefits that come from whatever position the church decides to take on this matter. There is also a cost and benefit that comes should the church decide to make no decision on this matter. For this reason, it seems appropriate for us to prayerfully and thoughtfully consider this matter.

What would be the "timeline" for the development of this policy... before or after new minister?

The Team does want to move forward in a timely manner, but we do not wish to rush. The Bishop and District Superintendent have been informed of this process taking place and our request to have the new pastor be supportive of the discernment process that has been started.

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How would this new policy be shown or made known to the community?

If the church votes to become a Reconciling Ministry Congregation, a statement that we are a Reconciling Ministry Congregation along with the Reconciling Ministry logo would be included on the opening page of the church website. It would also be included in church newsletters, social media and emails as part of the overall church branding.

With regard to church weddings, a statement would be included on the church website and in the wedding guidelines.

What would our restroom policy be?

Other policies are not under consideration at this time.

What will be the attitude towards those who vote against this change?

The Reconciling Ministry Team will make every effort to include everyone in the decision-making process and in the ministries of the church. There are already different perspectives and points of view on other matters among church members of the church. This particular matter should not get in the way of us showing love, understanding and mutual care for one another. We can have disagreements with one another and yet still find we are one in Christ and in our service.

If we choose to become Reconciling, will this status be in the background or present in all our church activities and services?

The focus of the church's life and activity is to be making disciples for the transformation of the world. Our mission will not change but we would be explicit and mindful of the need for us to consider the needs and perspectives of persons who in the past had often been treated in ways that were harmful and dehumanizing.

Calvary UMC Hosts Anna Lapwood, world-famous organist, on April 13.

What an honor it was to host world-renowned organist Anna Lapwood on April 13 at Calvary UMC! Anna literally pulled out all the stops on our Zimmer pipe organ and gave an inspiring performance. She charmed the audience with her energetic personality and her love of music and showed what a versatile and colorful pipe organ we have.

On Saturday, Anna's rehearsal day, we left while she practiced and returned to church later in the afternoon. When Anna saw us again, she cam bouncing off the organ bench and through the Chancel, threw her arms up and said, "This is a *wonderful organ!* I Love it!



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Following the concert on Sunday, she met Cornel Zimmer, president and founder of Cornel Zimmer Organ Builders who built our organ, and shared with him that in addition to the organ having all the sounds that she wanted and needed for her repertoire, our organ console is one of the most "comfortable" that she's played, meaning that pistons and other controls were easy to find and the overall organization of the console was excellent.

The audience – about 425 people that included Calvary UMC members and the public - gave Anna tremendous applause and appreciation. While people were waiting in line outside before seating began, Anna was in the Parlor room upstairs. She looked out the window and saw a young boy that she had met in Atlantic City last year. She opened the window and called out to him, and then waved to the crowd and said, "I'll see you soon!" Comments after the concert included "Wow!" "Unbelievable!" "Can you get her back again?" "I'm so glad I could be here; this was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity." Those who stayed to meet Anna afterwards came away with a hug or handshake and a photo that they will cherish for many years. Anna met every single person who stayed and greeted each one with the same enthusiasm.

Many people asked how we were able to have Anna perform at our church. It started with a request several years ago, when the new organ contract was signed, and we were looking ahead to its completion and a dedication service. A church member who had discovered Anna on social media suggested her. I emailed her management and inquired about the possibility of Anna playing the dedication concert. She expressed interest but ultimately her 2024 tour schedule did not allow for a stop in Frederick. Last summer, I received an email from Anna's manager asking if we were still interested as they were putting together her 2025 tour. The answer was a resounding "yes!" In conversation on the way to the airport on Sunday evening, I asked Anna how she chooses where she will play (given her popularity and large number of requests she receives, I wanted to know how we made the cut!) and she said that all requests go into a giant spreadsheet along with the location and the specifications of the organ. She reviews the requests and if the organ specifications will not support her repertoire, she marks it red for "no." (If the organ has no chimes, it's an automatic "no," she said.) Organs that have mostly the right specifications are marked orange, and those that meet all her requirements are marked green. Then the list is narrowed down by location. So, our new organ and the timing all came together and allowed us this amazing opportunity.

This concert was made possible primarily by a Calvary UMC member who wishes to remain anonymous. We thank them for their generosity and wanting to share their love of music with all of us. It was an incredible act of kindness.

We want to give another sincere thanks to all 23 of the volunteers who helped with the concert. From tickets to seating, removing/putting back cushions in the pews, and helping our retirement center friends in and out, it was a huge effort and the concert couldn't have happened without all of you.

Thanks to all of you for your support of our music ministry.

Being in this world, but not of this world ... (John 17:14-16)

This concept lived out by our neighboring Amish folk, adopted from Jesus' final prayer on behalf of his followers prior to his trial, crucifixion, and resurrection, was intended for all of us who seek to be Jesus' disciples. My understanding of this precept is that we bear—witness to God's kin-dom of love, mercy, and justice for all people in the face of earthly—domination systems that may choose to govern otherwise, as did Jesus in the face of Temple authorities and the ruling Roman Empire.

As our country turned from the 19th to the 20th century, Protestant faith community leaders introduced what was known as the "social gospel movement" to advance Christian ethics in the face of injustices in society resulting from the gilded age. They addressed such problems as poverty, child and unfair labor practices, and prison reform. During this period the Methodists, following Wesleyan principles, developed the *Social Creed*, forerunner of what today are the United Methodist *Social Principles*. Revised by the UMC General Conference last year, these principles address issues of environmental, economic, political, and social concern. Guidance related to their implementation is afforded by the UMC Global Board of Church and Society whose headquarters is located in the United Methodist Building.

The United Methodist Building, located on Capitol Hill, bears witness to God's kin-dom in the midst of our national governance. It was established 100 years ago following World War I, a period of violence and injustice in our society. The same building also houses branches of other faith communities today; and it was in this building that a number of Christian witness protest marches were planned, including that of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. for civil rights.

As United Methodists, we have a long and storied history of seeking justice, showing mercy, and walking humbly with the Lord (Micah 6:8). May Calvary continue to bear witness to that heritage in the times ahead, guided by our *Social Principles* in the spirit of Jesus' teachings and example.
