Tend the Garden - A pondering from the Pastor's Desk

"The Lord God took the human and settled them in the Garden of Eden to farm it and to take care of it." ~ Genesis 2:15

We were not put here to consume the world. We were put here to tend it. A garden. A human being. A calling to care for something that does not belong to us.

I first encountered conversations about AI in a faith context in 2017, studying in Cambridge alongside classmates from across the globe, people who brought a much wider view of the world than my own. The conversations were heady. And I remember sitting there thinking, naively, how could a computer ever take over the world? How could it ever take over Jesus? It seemed, at the time, a little bit other worldly and unlikely. I really wasn't considering all the possibilities.

For those of us who are old enough, think back to the first computers you ever saw. Not the Macintosh box or the old IBM tower on somebody's desk. I mean the real early ones. Massive towers behind glass walls, filling entire climate-controlled rooms. Whole buildings devoted to machines that could do a fraction of what the little device in your back pocket does today. We marveled at them. We were also a little afraid of them. And some people said they would take over everything.

Before that, there was the Industrial Revolution, which I just finished teaching this semester in US Modern History. Machines replaced human labor on a scale no one had ever seen. Factories replaced farms. Cities swelled. Whole trades disappeared overnight. In this Gilded Age there was real fear, real suffering, and genuine loss. And over time, remarkable resilience and adaptation. I believe, if we are wise, humble, and truly care for our neighbor, we will navigate this moment too.

But here is what I want us to pay attention to right now, because I think it is closer to home than most people realize. The headlines this month have been loud about AI wiping out humanity. Researchers resigning from major tech companies, scientists warning of extinction risk within a decade,

politicians scrambling to regulate an industry moving faster than any oversight can follow. In 2023, hundreds of AI scientists and industry figures, including the heads of the top U.S. labs, signed a statement placing AI extinction risk alongside pandemics and nuclear war as a global priority. Nobel Prize winners have weighed in. Members of Congress have convened hearings. The United Kingdom is considering legislation to prohibit the development of superintelligent AI altogether. I take all of that seriously. I think we should. And yet the thing that has my attention right now is something more immediate, and a lot closer to home. It is water.

Here is something that might surprise you. Every time someone uses an AI, to create a funny picture or answer a simple question, somewhere a server is working hard to generate that response. Those servers run hot, around the clock, and they have to be cooled to keep from overheating. The quickest and cheapest way to do that is water. Not a little water. A lot of water. Researchers estimate that AI infrastructure could use up to 6.6 trillion liters of water annually by 2027. In Texas alone, data centers were estimated to use approximately 25 billion gallons in 2025. That number could rise to 161 billion gallons by 2030.

Think of it this way. Those giant glass rooms full of towers that some of you remember? Data centers are the modern version of that, only scaled up enormously, running hotter, and drinking water the way those old machines drank air conditioning. The difference is the sheer size of the appetite.

Now, some of you in downtown Frederick may have noticed something this past month. Periodically our water has run slightly yellow, slightly cloudy. Our Weekday School staff alerted the office twice about water quality concerns, because state regulations require childcare facilities to have clean, safe

drinking water to stay operational. Twice this September we checked the city website and called the water office to find out what was going on. The answer, and it is entirely plausible, is that it was probably routine hydrant flushing. That happens. It is normal maintenance. And the issue appears to have resolved itself. So I want to be clear: I am not drawing conclusions without data, and I am not trying to alarm anyone about our water.

But the question it raised in my mind has not gone away. Because across this country, communities near large data centers have begun reporting real and significant concerns about their water supplies. These are not fringe stories. They are showing up in local papers from Virginia to Arizona to the Pacific Northwest. And there is a large data center being built right next to us in Adamstown.

I raise this not to frighten anyone but to invite us into a conversation that people of faith are actually well equipped to have. The kind of conversation John Wesley would have called holy conferencing.

Wesley gave us three simple rules: Do Good. Do No Harm. Stay in Love with God. Simple enough to teach a child, demanding enough to reorganize a life around. The one I keep coming back to this month is the middle one. Do No Harm. Because what Wesley understood, and what our tradition has always insisted, is that harm is not only what we do on purpose. It is also what we participate in without asking questions. What we fund without looking closely. What we consume without counting the cost. Theologians sometimes call this corporate sin, the ways we get quietly woven into systems that damage people and creation, not because we are malicious, but because we never stopped to ask whether we should be part of them.

Jeff Goldblum's Ian Malcolm said it pretty well in Jurassic Park: **"Your scientists were so preoccupied with whether or not they could, that they didn't stop to think if they should."** That line is thirty years old and honestly, it has never fit better.

We can build these systems. We are building them. Wesley's second rule asks the harder question. Should we? And if so, how, and at whose expense?

For those of you who work in technology, or have retirement accounts and portfolios doing well right now in part because of this industry, this is not an indictment. It is an invitation to sit with a harder question. We are allowed to benefit from something and still ask: at what cost, and to whom? Genesis does not say tend the garden when it is convenient. It does not say tend the garden unless the quarterly returns are good. It says tend it. Full stop.

And for those who feel like this technology is just beyond understanding, I want to say this gently: you do not need to understand how AI works to understand what it requires. It requires cooling. It requires energy. It requires land. Every generation has understood those things. And every generation has been asked who bears the cost when those resources get consumed without care or accountability.

The AI industry right now is largely unregulated, in its ethical practices and in how it uses water and energy. That is not a political statement. That is a creation care and stewardship statement.

So what do we do? We pay attention. We ask questions of our officials and our elected representatives. We read beyond the headlines. We make choices as consumers and as investors that reflect what we actually believe on Sunday mornings. We talk to our neighbors. And we bring these questions into our life together, because this is exactly the right place to wrestle with the hard ones.

Do good. Do no harm. Stay in love with God.

We were put here to tend the garden. So let us tend.

CHURCH & SOCIETY: FAITH THAT SHOWS UP

So, what is Church & Society? It's the part of Calvary's life that connects what we believe on Sunday with how we live the rest of the week. It guides our missions and outreach and helps us think about how we speak and act as people of faith in the Frederick community.

Our guide is the United Methodist Social Principles. They aren't a rulebook, and they don't tell anyone how to vote. They're a shared framework, rooted in Scripture and our Wesleyan tradition, that helps us honor the dignity of every person, care for creation, and stand alongside neighbors who are hurting. It's why we pack food bags, build beds, send mission teams, and partner with local ministries, and why we try to understand the story behind the needs we see.

Coming in November

This November we'll celebrate our partnership with the Frederick Rescue Mission and Faith House as our dedicated Love Offering. This year we're adding a Wednesday night online study exploring the crisis of homelessness in our community. Our hope is that it deepens the giving and serving we already do by helping us dig into the "why" behind it.

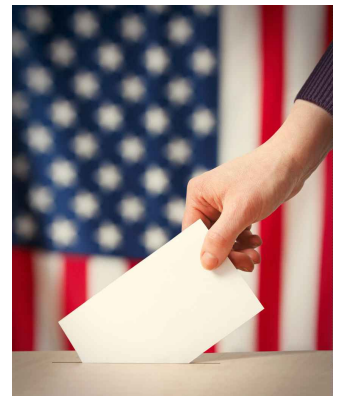
It all comes back to Jesus' words in Matthew 25: "Just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me."

A Christian Perspective on Civic Duty and Privilege

In the history of our democratic republic one of our most cherished privileges and civic duties is to exercise our right to vote for those who will govern our local communities, states, and country. The history of voting patterns and our nation's experience with its political parties is a special study in itself, one that defies simple labels.

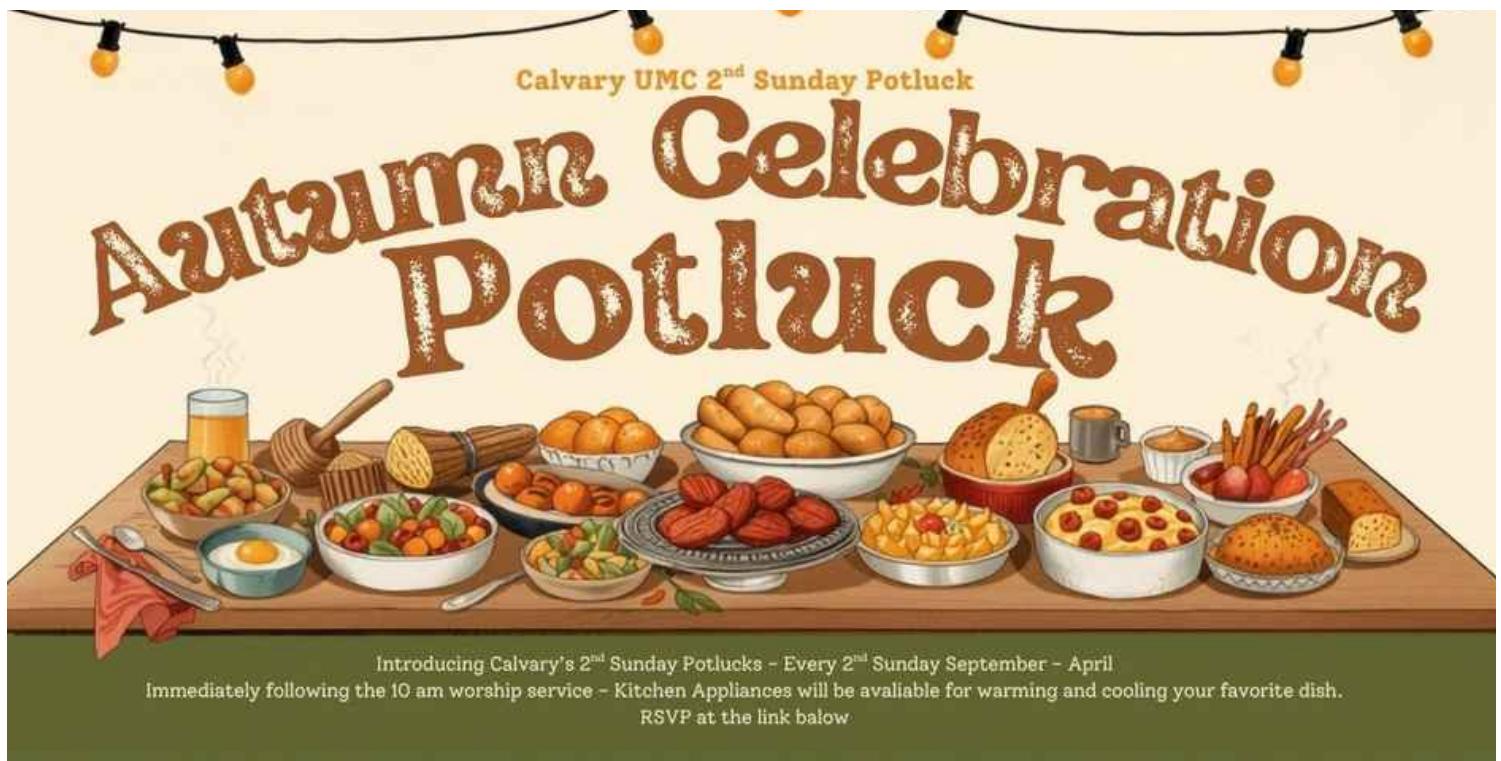
We have wrestled with gerrymandering issues of voting districts in states; popular vs. electoral college votes on election outcomes; civil rights of those who are entitled to vote, even poll taxes to make it difficult for some to vote; and, in more recent years, corporate wealth and its influence on political outcomes in elections, as well as claims of fraudulent elections for which our courts have found little if any evidence. One fact, however, has remained relatively constant in our lifetime. Of those who are eligible to vote, only about 50-65% do so, even in an era in which mail ballots have become available for those less able to vote in person.



As Christians of the United Methodist tradition, we are strongly encouraged to exercise our right to vote. As our Social Principles state (p. 45), "our involvement in political systems is rooted in the gospel imperative to love our neighbors, to do justice, and to care for the vulnerable. ...(We) acknowledge that love requires responsible political action and engagement aimed at the betterment of society and promotion of the common good." We are expected to do this with a sense of humility, in prayerful willingness to discern God's guidance.

So, my brothers and sister in Christ, though we may not all be of one opinion concerning the issues at stake in the forthcoming mid-term elections, let us go forth with a Christian perspective and exercise our civic duty and privilege of voting this November. 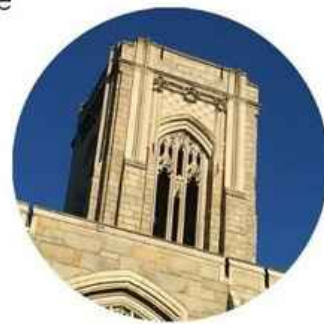
